

4. Certain limits and boundaries are established under various treaties with neighbouring States (not all are in force).
5. Limits of coastal waters adjacent to each of the Australian States and of the Northern Territory are established under the Coastal Waters (State Powers) Act 1980, Coastal Waters (Northern Territory Powers) Act 1980 and the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act 2006.
6. This map has been prepared taking into account the obligations of Australia under the Timor Sea Treaty and the Treaty with Timor-Leste concerning Certain Maritime Arrangements in the Timor Sea. Therefore, the map does not present all areas in which Australia may assert a continental shelf jurisdiction.
7. In the event of an inconsistency between this map, and the territorial sea baselines or limits established under Australian legislation or the treaties, then the legislative instruments or the treaties shall prevail. shall prevail.
